Trinity School Street Scheme

Dear Minister,

I am writing on behalf of the Environment, Housing and Infrastructure Scrutiny Panel following recent correspondence received from a member of the public concerning engagement and communication around proposed road changes at Trinity School. The issues raised align with matters the Panel has considered previously, including through Written Question [WQ.10/2026](#) relating to the School Street pilot at Trinity School, and during the Panel's public hearing of 9th April 2025 on the Department's wider approach to consultation on changes to the road network.

In your written response to WQ.10/2026, you confirmed that the permanent design brief for the Trinity scheme will not be available until early 2027 and that physical works cannot be undertaken until the summer of 2027 due to the diversion route for the Northern sewer network upgrades. You also stated that the design brief would be made publicly available at that time and that prior consultation feedback would inform the final design. The stakeholder's concerns, however, highlight the ongoing uncertainty felt by parishioners and school users regarding interim arrangements, communication of timelines, and how their views will shape the next phase of work.

The Panel also notes that during the April 2025 hearing on Engagement and Consultation on Traffic Changes, your officers outlined the Department's processes for consultation, including early problem-identification stages, letter-drops, parish engagement, and reliance on both data collection and local feedback. They also acknowledged the challenges of ensuring the public understands when and how to participate, and the need to improve clarity around trials, adjustments, and how evidence is used to inform decisions. The concerns raised in the recent correspondence suggest that these issues remain live for affected communities.

In light of this, the Panel would be grateful if you could clarify:

- How the Department intends to maintain clear communication with parishioners and Trinity School stakeholders throughout 2026, given that design development and funding decisions will not progress until 2027;
- What actions will be taken to ensure that the forthcoming public engagement reflects the improvements and lessons identified during previous hearings, particularly around advanced notice, transparency of evidence, and expectations during trial periods; and

- Whether further interim updates or information materials can be provided to reduce uncertainty for the local community while the temporary layout remains in place.

The Panel would be grateful to receive your written response within five working days of receipt of this letter. Please note that it is the Panel's intention to publish your response on the States Assembly website.

We look forward to hearing from you.
